## On Hiroshima-Nagasaki Anniversary,




Let's get out of Nuclear Shadow

On the 67<sup>th</sup>anniversary of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, we need to call an end to the nuclear experiment.

It was my great pleasure to meet the future of India who can accompany me to take people out of Nuclear Shadow. I happen to visit Infant Jesus Maculation School in Bangalore on the very day of Hiroshima Anniversary to share my experience associated to visit of Hiroshima to the students of 8<sup>th</sup> & 10<sup>th</sup>.

Considering interest level & knowledge seeking of teens I shared my experience with children of Infant Jesus Maculation School on 6<sup>th</sup> Aug 2012. It started with the presentation in class 8<sup>th</sup> with strength of 35.





The presentation was prepared keeping in view level of understanding of 8<sup>th</sup> grade students. I begin the presentation with their area of interest "the cartoons". I asked about the fights they had witnessed with the cartoon characters & told about its unrealistic injuries, losses. I presented the data about the major wars so far in the World & their massive destruction.

After which I diverted the topic to the real world by revising their knowledge on World War II, followed by the facts of atomic

bombing at Hiroshima & Nagasaki. I shared as:

At 8:15 a.m. on Aug. 6, 1945, the United States dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima, killing around 140,000 people& more. The death toll included men, women and children who died instantaneously, and thousands who died within months from the lingering radiation sickness. The U.S. attack on Nagasaki three days on Aug 9<sup>th</sup> later took the lives of 75,000 more.





were being shown with pictures taken by me at Museum. I taught them the folding of paper crane, and its significance. A card with message of peace was given to everyone to pin in their shirts as remembrance of the occasion.

for peace towards the end of the session.



After this 1hr 30 minutes with 8<sup>th</sup> grade, I moved to the more responsible minds, the 10<sup>th</sup> grade students. As their study schedule was at priority I was provided with 30-45 minutes to explain the importance of the day & the share the facts about the event of 6<sup>th</sup>& 9<sup>th</sup>August 1945. It was more interactive session with the students numbered to 45. They were into the guest of India's Future by end of the session. They also shown their grief for the people who lost their lives &also who are still suffering. The session was ended with peace

According to the schedule 15minutes before the children leave the school premises, students of 8<sup>th</sup>& 10<sup>th</sup> were asked to assemble in quadrangle &

provided with candles to pray & remember those people who suffered for us, to make us know the real meaning of Nuclear Weapons. They pledge that they worth peoplewho sacrificed their life for the welfare and will stand for anti-nuclear& anti- bombing. They will contribute for peace.

As Hiroshima-Nagasaki Memorial Day is an occasion to ponder the destructive capacity of nuclear weapons, as well as the wisdom of all uses of nuclear energy — particularly given the spectre cast by the meltdown of the reactors in Fukushima, Japan, last year.
