Introduction

Chakla Suparna Shilpalay (CSS) is a registered Non-Governmental Organization working in semi-urban and rural areas of West Bengal. The office of the organization is situated at Chakla, Subarnapur colony, 60 kms away from Kolkata city. The area is dominated by Hindu lower caste (SC) and refugees (illegally migrated from Bangladesh), who formed a colony along with local Muslims and a few Christians. They are very poor and earn their bread by working in nearby urban towns as daily laborers. Currently all the parents of the colony are eager to send their children to schools and colleges for education. Now they have realized that only education of their children can improve their standard of living by ensuring high salary jobs. So the literacy rate of the colony is very high at this moment. Even then violation of Human rights is very common across the area due to lack of Human Rights awareness among the people and as a result often conflict, discord, feuds are irrupted among the people of different religions in the locality.

Main Aim

Establish freedom of religion and belief as essential human rights and avoid all sorts of intolerance, demean, tension, violence and conflicts from the society.

Objective

Educate and motivate the people of different religious groups about human rights and eliminate all form of intolerance. Ultimately religious freedom, human rights and human dignity will be maintained through awareness classes.

Timeline

Two day program - On 16th February 2013 and 17th February 2013 from 9:30am to 5:30pm

Methodology

Expected learning outcomes

Short-term

Participants have oriented, motivated and understood the freedom of religion and beliefs as essential human right and other rights of human beings.

Long-term

All sorts of social violence, conflicts and tension will be resolved, peace and harmony will be prevailed in the society.

Resources Required

Funds, manpower, teaching materials, training materials, training hall, audio visual equipments were required.

Language Problem

There was no language problem (Bengali was also used)

Community Chosen

Semi-urban Village

Location

Chakla Suparna Shilpalay (CSS), Subarnapur colony, P.O. Chakla, Pin - 743440,

Have you already had contact with this community?

Why have you chosen this community/ target group?

Tension and misunderstanding are present in the young generation of Hindus and Muslims in this colony, so in order to mitigate this problem I have selected this area.

How did you ensure the balance of gender, ages etc?

The matter was discussed with local organizers and finally selected 32 participants. Out of 32, 14 are female and 18 are male and the age group of participants falls between 17 to 34 years.

What steps have you taken to lessen the tension between the participants from different faith groups?

I insisted participants to have patience and initiate open and free discussion, exchange dialogue among each other by avoiding all tension.
