

Introduction

Sobha College of Teacher Education (PG) is an offspring of the Sobha Trust for Charity and Education. The college gives importance to community development which includes medical camps, donation of teaching aids to *Anganvadis* (Day care centers for women and children), orphanages etc., Seminars, counseling, Science Club and Mathematics Club etc., are some of the avenues for co-curricular activities. College gives more emphasis to women's education.

Interestingly this HRE was marked by the participation of 15 Students from Ferris University, First Women's University in Japan. They visited IARF Member Group, IFPP Pathanamthitta headed by Dr. Thomas Mathew as part of their internship in India. Their main indent was to study about Indian Culture, Education and Religious System. Though they are not aware about the complex religious set up of India, the time they with teacher



trainees provided them enough insights and sparks. On the first day they joined HRE program and actively involved in discussions and cultural performs. The college management, teachers and supporting staff gave them a warm welcome and enjoyed the participation. The students had interactions each other and discussed Religious Freedom issues in India and Faith based traditional life of Japan. For many (both nationals), UDHR was an unknown information and that provided an opportunity for the facilitator to explain about UDHR and the role of IARF to reach the society and create more grass root HR activists on Human Rights.

College principal Dr. Sheela Rani inaugurated the workshop by traditional lamp lighting. Management and teaching staff of the college actively worked for the smooth execution of the program.

Main Aim

To promote and educate interfaith among various Religious groups / organizations to understand each other and give respect other Religion/Community.

Objectives

- Propagate about the religious harmony to reach various groups.
- Understand the awareness of Human rights and its importance.

Time line

1-2 March 2013. Five sessions were arranged in two consecutive days. Three hours has been taken for each session.

Session out line

- 1. Inaugural Function by inviting V.I.P. etc., to address the gathering and to start the program.
- 2. The program starts with Participants' introduction and expectation.
- 3. Briefing about the HRE Program, issues in Common Showing short films etc.
- 4. Presentation and Group Work about short films message in different angle.
- 5. Presentation from 4 or 5 groups with peer and trainer review opportunities by Preparing Chart, Role Play, Street Play, Songs & Dance etc.
- 6. Concrete planning for back home activities and Valedictory function by issuing Certificates etc.

On completion of each session assessment report will be called for.

Methodology

Lecture, showing short films, participatory learning, Group discussion and role play etc., from four or five groups.

Issues raised during each session.

How the minorities are over powered in certain areas, how the majority dominated in different places, necessity of tolerance while dominating by different groups, in balance arising by religious problems.

Ideas and solutions to the issues identified by the participants.

• The participants will attend all the sessions without fail, as the Series of sessions have arranged in two consecutive days by informing them well in advance.

Risk factors and how they were taken care of?

No such issues were raised

Expected Learning Outcomes

Short -Term

- To understand by the participants about UN Declaration and conventions etc.
- Equality among Human rights should be protected and interfaith to be developed.
- The values and faiths of the other religion/community should be respected
- The denial of Human rights to anybody should be avoided.

Long-term

Inter religion/community harmony and prevalence of peace.

What resources were used? Did the arrangements like equipment, meeting hall, seating etc work smoothly?

HRE Manual, handouts, Video films CDs, provided to Facilitators during the Kolkata program and thereafter guide lines received from HRE Coordinator & SACC Office then and there.

There was no language problem. All were able to follow English.

Mararikulam, Alapuzha, Kerala State

Distance from Home

Around 60 kms.

Reason for choosing this Community/Target group

The chosen group belongs to teaching community. The target level of HRE can be easily achieved through them.

Balance of gender, ages etc.

Here the participants were dominated by females in strength. They were aged between 22-35.

Steps taken to order to lessen the tension between the Participants from different faith groups

Views can be exchanged between the groups and understand each other faiths.

Have you had Ice-breaking/team-building activities

Yes, while forming groups in group discussion, the different religion/Community will be mingled in each group.

Did you include any young people? If so, how many?

Most of the teacher trainees were young.
